aback when I saw that 7% of the respondents (and I must admit here, regarding the size of our membership that does not equate to very many of our members) posed the question "What is the Rotary Foundation?"

Doing Good In The World

So... a modicum of information never goes astray and indeed it will help me fill some space!

The Rotary Foundation transforms our gifts into projects that change

lives both close to home and around the world.

As the charitable arm of Rotary International, the Foundation taps into a global network of Rotarians who invest their time, money, and expertise into the priorities, such as eradicating polio and promoting peace. Foundation grants empower Rotarians to approach challenges such as poverty, illiteracy, and malnutrition with sustainable solutions that leave a lasting impact.

Strong financial oversight, a stellar charity rating, and a unique funding model mean that the Foundation makes the very most of all contributions.

The collective leadership and expertise of well over million members helps it tackle some of the world's biggest challenges, locally and globally. United by common values and vision for the future the Foundation sharpens its focus with targeted specific causes that will reach communities most in need.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

For more than 100 years, the guiding principles have been the foundation upon which Rotary values and tradition stand. The Four-Way Test, Object of Rotary, and the Avenues of Service express its commitment to service, fellowship, diversity, integrity, and leadership.

AREAS OF FOCUS

The Foundation directs its efforts in six areas to enhance local and global impact.

HISTORY OF THE ROTARY FOUNDATION



At the **1917** convention, the sixth and outgoing RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed to set up an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.

It has grown from an initial contribution of US\$26.50 to more than US\$1billion and has one of the largest and most prestigious international fellowship programs in the world.

GROWTH OF THE FOUNDATION

In **1929**, the Foundation made its first gift of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organisation, created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen, later grew into Easter Seals.

When Rotary founder Paul Harris died in 1947, contributions began pouring in to Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the Foundation.

EVOLUTION OF FOUNDATION PROGRAMS

Also starting in 1947, the Foundation established its first program, Fellowships for Advance Study, later known as Ambassadorial Scholarships which was the largest nongovernmental and most international scholarship program in the world. Scholars studied in a country other than their own where they serve as unofficial ambassadors of goodwill. Over 37,000 scholars from some 110 countries received scholarships at a cost of almost US\$446 million. The program ended in 2013. Scholarships are now funded by district and global grants and are offered directly through Rotary clubs..

From 1965-66 three programs were launched:

• Group Study Exchange awards which are made to paired Rotary districts to provide travel expenses for a team of non-Rotarians from a variety of vocations. Rotarian hosts organize a four- to six-week itinerary of educational and cultural points of interest. Since 1965, almost 48,000 individuals in more than 11,000 teams from more than 100 countries have participated at a cost of US\$85 million.

• Awards for Technical Training

• Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Objective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants and which provide matching funds for the international service projects of Rotary clubs and districts. Since 1965, more than 20,000 Matching Grants projects in 166 countries have been funded at a cost of more than US\$198 million.

In 1978 Rotary introduced the Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants. The first 3-H Grant funded a project to immunise 6 million Philippine children against polio which was in turn followed by the PolioPlus program to eradicate polio worldwide in 1985.



In 1987-88, the first peace forums were held, leading to Rotary Peace Fellowships and *THE CHANNEL - page 2* 3rd August 2020 in 2013, new district, global, and packaged grants were created to enable Rotarians around the world to respond to the world's greatest needs.

In short, the Rotary Foundation is a non-profit corporation that supports the efforts of Rotary International to achieve world understanding and peace through international humanitarian, educational, and cultural exchange programs. It is supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world.



A Well-Planned Retirement

Another heartwarming narrative

Outside England's Bristol Zoo there is a parking lot for 150 cars and 8 buses and or 25 years, its parking fees (cars **\$1.40**, buses about **\$7.00**) were managed by a very pleasant attendant.

Then, one day, after 25 solid years of never missing a day of

work, he just didn't show up; so the zoo management called the city council and asked it to send them another parking agent.

The council after doing a little research got back to them with the information that the parking lot was the zoo's own responsibility.

The zoo advised the council that the attendant was a city employee.

The city council responded that the lot attendant had never been on the city payroll.

Meanwhile, sitting in his villa somewhere on the coast of Spain, or France, or Italy, is a man who'd apparently had a ticket booth installed completely on his own and then had simply begun to show up every day, commencing to collect and keep the parking fees, estimated at about \$560 per day.... for 25 years.

Assuming he worked 7 days a week, this amounts to just over \$7 million dollars..... and no one even knows his name.



Some updates on New Generation (Youth Service) RYDA



Back in March RYDA was all set to release news on the freshly minted RYDA 5.0 program, which had begun rolling out across Australia and New Zealand in February. Then.... well, everyone knows what happened next which resulted in RYDA workshops being put on hold and work was

undertaken to support their classroom teachers as they found themselves under increased pressure to change the way they taught. The result was RYDA 5.0 at a Social Distance.

OK, what is new in RYDA 5.0?

The link between the RYDA workshop and pre and post classroom learning has been upgraded with a complete implementation guide for teachers to navigate their role in providing road safety education for their students by reflecting RYDA's road safety messages in school policy, school curriculum and community engagement. Within the workshops, RYDA have created several fun and engaging activities around mind state and it's impact on road safety, new in-session guizzes on fatigue and hazard perception and new engaging videos to capture our students attention.

The RYDA website has been re-vamped, creating a number of fact sheets, blogs, games and tips, student reflection journals and even a dinner table conversation starter for parents. All designed to support longer-term, extended learning to help students become active citizens with positive, socially connected road user identities.



What is RYDA 5.0 at a social distance?

Bespoke classrooms and distance learning resources have been created to meet the challenges faced by students in this time of uncertainty with resources ranging from light activities to keep students learning during lockdown and self-isolation to complete classroom or virtual classroom lesson plans.

Feedback to RYDA from teachers has been overwhelmingly positive with many confirming that they have either shared the resources with their students and/or families or have planned to utilise them later in the year to tie in with upcoming lesson plans/curriculum learning.



The road forward for RYDA workshops

Aware that nothing beats face-to-face and personal engagement when it comes to learning, wherever restrictions have been lifted workshops are now up and running. all delivered in compliance with government and individual school policies. A number of RYDA workshops have already been successfully delivered in Queensland in Brisbane and

Toowoomba with a number more upcoming in Sydney and across New Zealand. Hopefully in the very near future we will be able to continue our association and once again volunteer for assisting in workshops at Olympic Park. Watch this space!



While acknowledging that the Covid-19 National Youth situation provides many uncertainties NSYF have assured everyone that planning for the Science Forum have assured everyone that planning for the 2021 NYSF team Year 12 Program is on track for January next year.






