This motto was first expressed at Rotary's first Convention held in Chicago in 1910. Rotary's first appeal for aid to disaster victims was in 1913 when \$US25,000.00 was given for flood relief in Ohio & Indiana USA.

However, the first Community Service project took place in 1907 when Chicago Rotarians led a campaign to install a public 'comfort station/ in the city mall. The scope for Community Service is unlimited. When deciding on a course of action first keep in mind local government requirements, should they be necessary.

Our record in this area is I feel exceptionally good, particularly over the past few years when we have given practical support to Quirindi during the drought and beyond, to the Southern Tablelands particularly during the devastating bushfires, supporting local schools with annual Citizenship Awards, numerous local groups such as Let's Get Going, Stitching Hearts, Black Dog and Rivendell, substantial financial support for the ANZAC Institute at Concord Hospital and much,much more, all of which not only assists those organisations but together with the Farmers Market elevates the name of Rotary within the community.

There is absolutely no doubt whatsoever that our community would be the poorer by far without the involvement of the Rotary Club of Concord and we can look forward I'm sure to much more of the same.

Therefore, if being a member of a committee within Rotary is now done on a voluntary basis rather than at the direction of the President, can I urge everyone who is NOT already committed to one of the Avenues of Service (the Farmers Market has had an extremely effective committee operating for a number of years now) to think about the area you would like to be involved in and talk to the Director of your choice.

We have for many years been a very successful member of the Rotary family, so now in this difficult time let's show that we can "*up the ante*"!

Dire Covid-19 aftermath on our doorstep

In an interview with Guardian Australia, veteran social justice campaigner Tim Costello has called for an increase in foreign aid to help the Pacific deal with health, social and economic challenges exacerbated by Covid-19.

Estimates from the United Nations World Institute for Development Economics Research he said, cited a severe economic contraction that would result in an additional 1.2 million people in the Pacific and Timor-Leste being pushed into extreme poverty (poverty defined as living below \$1.90 a day) which would be an increase of over 40% on pre-Covid-19 levels and Australia needed to act.




The comparison between the defence spending and that on aid and development (\$10 for every \$1) was unsustainable for the fact that because "the software of aid has to rise because the hardware of military is what you don't want to use. You have cruise missiles to deter, not to use. The software of aid that literally feeds hungry kids and gets health to desperate people is profoundly important". So that's really the message of [the new campaign] 'end Covid for all'.

With Australia's Pacific aid actually at the 2012 levels, we must do much more.

Maybe this is an area of International Service Rotary should look to?

LAUGHTER IS THE BEST MEDICINE

Another Government Study Provides outstanding Results

CSIRO Officials admitted that they found about 200 dead crows on the highway between Noonamah and Palmerston, in Northern Territory, where there was concern that they may have died from Avian Flu.

The Territory Government approved and the CSIRO contracted a bird pathologist to examine the remains of all the crows and he confirmed the problem was definitely NOT Avian Flu, much to everyone's relief.

However, he determined that 98% of the crows had been killed by impact with trucks, and only 2% were killed by car impact. (Didn't know there was a difference!)

The Territory Government then hired an Ornithological Behaviourist to determine the disproportionate percentages for truck v car kills.

After 18 months of research and \$2.7 million spent, the Ornithological Behaviourist determined the cause in the deaths.
